The home has been identified as the most common place for children age one to four to be injured. A collaborative effort between Santa Maria's Healthy Homes: Block by Block program and Cincinnati Children's Hospital's Comprehensive Children's Injury Center, along with many volunteers, spent the day on November 12th reducing the risk of home injuries

to children under five. Training, equipment and tools were provided and volunteers were trained to provide 2-3 pre-registered families with home safety education and basic home safety equipment installation. New Family Center in Lower Price Hill Opens Through Community Makeover Project

This year, Lower Price Hill and Santa Maria's non-profit partner, Community Matters, were selected as the recipient of the annual Community Makeover project in Cincinnati. July 28 marked the much anticipated event sponsored by P&G, The Cincinnati Reds Community Fund and the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Garden.



Close to 400 voolunteers from these businesses and agencies, along with their partner organizations, worked throughout the day to improve three major neighborhood locations in Lower Price Hill, including renovations to the former Espy Boys & Girls Club, now the Joe Williams Family Center, a program of Santa Maria in partnership with Community Matters. Named after major Santa Maria supporter



and Cincinnati Reds' Chairman of the Board, Joe Williams, the Family Center was orginally gifted to Santa Maria's partner and neighboring organization, Community Matters, who in turn rented on favorable terms to Santa Maria as a replacement to the Youth Development building which consisted of three small rooms in a once-housing development.

"Having Joe's name on this building is really satisfying to me," said Jim Holmstrom, Program Director of Santa Maria's Youth Development program. "So many people know him as the Chairman of the Board of the Reds, but I knew him as the guy who came in every week to help me do a youth group -- he and his buddy Andy Espy. I think it's just really wonderful for me to see Joe's name up there. I can't think of anybody's name I'd rather have up there."

The Family Center provides a larger facility and learning space for Santa Maria's Youth Development program and will offer a place for other organizations to host group meetings. The new building includes a gym, tutoring center, kitchen, café, enhanced grounds and more. Santa Maria hosted an open house on August 26 to introduce the fully renovated Family Center to the community. The receival of the new building nicely coincides with the anniversary of Santa Maria's 50th year in Price Hill.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on July 28 in the Lower Price Hill Community Garden to dedicate the three improved locations. During the dedication, P&G and the Cincinnati Reds Community Fund awarded Santa Maria \$35,000 for its future work with Youth Development.

"I'm thrilled at the prospects we have for the new building," said Holmstrom. "I'm humbled by all of this and by the generosity of everyone -- every one of you who put this work in and volunteered your time into doing this work today to make this neighborhood a better place. I've never been more hopeful for this community."



Santa Maria Celebrates Holiday Season With Annual Community Events

The holiday season at Santa Maria starts off with the Price Hill Thanksgiving Day Parade at 10 am at Western Hills High School. The parade ends at St. Lawrence with a petting zoo, pony rides and a performance by the St. Lawrence Eagles choir. Santa Maria staff and family members will join in the festivites by passing out hot chocolate.

The following weekend Santa Maria participates in the annual Price Hill Holiday on the Hill celebration, which kicks off its December celebrations. As tradition dictates, Santa Maria's East Price Hill office (3301 Warsaw Avenue) offers pictures with Santa and hot chocolate and cookies from 10 am - 12 pm, Saturday, December 3. This event, sponsored by Santa Maria's Early Childhood and Wellness teams, is open to any family in the Price Hill Community. Santa Maria is very grateful to the continuous and generous donors, including Summit County Day School, St. Martin of Tours and Elder High School, who help make the holiday season special.





Price Hill's Iconic Mosaics Welcome New Addition Nearly 20 Years Later

In 1997, then-Santa Maria youth social worker, Kelly Tannen, and current staff member, Brenda Merrick, led a captivating youth project in Price Hill known as "Art on the Hill." Funded by the Hamilton Department of Human Services, the project contributed three mosaics to Price Hill in an effort to beautify the community. Nearly 20 years later this July, Santa Maria partner

and nonprofit community development corporation, Price Hill Will, along with project leader and Director of Creative Placemaking, Laura Jekel, worked in collaboration with Santa Maria to preserve and expand the tile mosaics on Warsaw Avenue. The original mosaics located at Santa Maria's East Price Hill location were created by about 30 Santa Maria students. The scenes were designed by the sutdents and placed with the help of artist Pam Kravetz. Designs

included hands on the front of the Warsaw offices and the panels on the wall by the once-IGA grocery store, now AutoZone, representing "Healthy Families and Safe Neighborhoods." Eleven additional panels were created but never installed on Warsaw due to an understanding that the wall would be torn down for the purposes of opening the view of the business from the street. Funded by the City of Cincinnati, Price Hill Will worked with ArtWorks Cincinnati, artist Lori Kay Harris-Farr, and members of the community to complete the project since

titled "Tapestry: Community Woven Together."

The dedicaton of the new portion of the mosaic mural was celebrated July 9 in front of AutoZone on Warsaw. Kelly Tannen, original project leader, attended the event among members of the community, Price Hill Will and Santa Maria. "It was so lovely to reconnect with the group from Santa Maria,"

Tannen said. "I have very fond memories

of my time working there. The new mosaics are truly beautiful, and I enjoyed the opportunity to meet the people who worked on them and who made the project possible."

Community Garden for Staff, Students Offers More Than Produce

Every summer, Santa Maria's Workforce Development Program's staff and students plant a community garden at 3208 Warsaw. The seasonal activity is celebrated with volunteers who come together to tend a garden (weeding, mulching and sowing) to grow foods that the community can take interest in. This year

the rewards have been immense: not only are participants reaping a good crop of fruits, vegetables, and herbs, but food is sent home with the GED programs' students, allowing an open dialogue about gardening and ecology.

planted and harvested assorted tomatoes, cantaloupe, green beans, okra, various peppers, eggplant and several herbs, including rosemary and mint. There are also pear trees which continue to grow and mature.

"I rely on the garden in the summer, mostly for herbs," says Kelsie, Santa Maria's Workforce Development Intake Specialist. "They are so expensive in the store and recipes only call for a tiny amount, so I love that I can grab a handful before leaving work. I also love the green tomatoes. I take them home and fry them!"

The garden also serves as a place of respite where students and staff can go visit when they need a moment to breathe, or simply feel closer to Mother Nature. "I feel like it's a tiny bit of nature that I can enjoy in a mostly concrete neighborhood," says Kelsie.

The garden has been a rewarding experience where both staff and students are able to stick their hands in the earth and see what is handed back.

Kindergarten Readiness Program Continues to Impact Lives

Lee Rose, Director of Community Investments for the Scipps Howard Foundation, recently experienced the direct services Santa Maria offers to its clients, specifically to the preschoolers of families in Price Hill. "In my role with the Scripps Howard Foundation, I've seen firsthand the way Santa Maria helps disadvantaged preschoolers," said Lee. Recently, Lee visited the home of *Marcus, age 6, who graduated from Santa Maria's program, and his 4-year-old brother, *Andre, who is just starting preschool. Since many families don't have cars, Santa Maria brings preschool education to the little ones' homes.

"As Andre's teacher started his lesson on the floor, I realized that this family doesn't have any furniture," said Lee. "I couldn't concentrate, wondering: Where did Marcus do his homework? Where do they eat their meals?' I also noticed there was nothing to read -- no books or magazines." In Greater Cincinnati, 400,000 people struggle with illiteracy and children who haven't developed basic reading skills before kindergarten are three times as likely to drop out of school. "These two bright, lively boys faced a disadvantage even before they started kindergarten. How can they possibly break out of poverty if they can't start school on the

same footing as other kids?"

Charlie Zix -- Connected to Sr. Blandina

Santa Maria Community Services has an incredible history in Cincinnati and has been touching the lives of Cincinnati residents for 119 years. This year our founder, Sister Blandina Segale, has been receiving a lot of attention from the media as she is being considered for sainthood. Through the Sisters of Charity, Sister Blandina established Santa Maria in 1897 as an Italian immigrant house to assist Italians who have moved to Cincinnati for the hopes of a better life.

It is always a pleaseure for us here at Santa Maria to come into contact with individuals in the community who were related to, or whose family benefitted from, the kindness of Sister Blandina and Santa Maria. We recenly had the pleasure of sitting down with Charlie Zix and hearing about his personal childhood connection to Sister Blandina and Santa Maria. When Blandina Segale (age 4) and her older birth sister, Justina, came over from Italy with their parents, they shared a ship with others traveling to Cincinnati. On the ship was also Maria Rosa (age 7), an orphan and the babysitter to the Segale sisters. It is very likely that though she was considered an orphan, Maria was indeed the cousin to the sisters and niece to the Segales.

In her adult life, Sister Blandina opened Santa Maria in downtown Cincinnati on the corner of 13th and Liberty Street. Maria Rosa's granddaughter would stop by Santa Maria with her son, Charlie Zix, to speak with Sister Blandina and, what was later recognized by Charlie, to receive services Santa Maria had to offer. "When we were grwowing up," says Charlie, "all we knew was Santa Maria. Nothing else."

Though only a boy, Charlie remembers playing games with the other children at Santa Maria and waiting for his mother as she spoke with Sister Blandina. "Once or twice a summer, mom would take us down there to Santa Maria... and mom would sit and talk to her, and we would play with the other kids. But as I got older, I realized,

'Mom probably went down there for assistance,' because Sister helped all the poor Italians." Charlie had the privilege as an adult to view the manifest of travelers' names from the ship to Cincinnati and saw the names of the Segale family and his great-grandmother, Maria Rosa.





Project Advance: AmeriCorps at Santa Maria Gets Things Done!

AmeriCorps is a 20 year old national program consisting of dedicated members who provide services to some of the most disadvantaged areas in our community. AmeriCorps members are paid a small living stipend, commit a year of their life to help address the needs of the community, and serve 40 hours a week at various sites across the country. They

come from a wide array of backgrounds, ages, and life experiences.

Three years ago, Santa Maria took over the mangement of education, life experiences and hearts to serve at the front lines of social services.

Members reflect the depth of services provied by Santa Maria: they serve as tutors, health service navigators, job coaches or housing advocates. These wonderful individuals are often the critical first responder to Santa Maria's clients, listening to their needs and responding In October, this

group of 140 took their pledge of service together and became part of the national grand total of over 1 million people that have served in AmeriCorps since its inception 20 years ago.

one locally established, well-recognized AmeriCorps program, now called Project Advance. Each year Santa Maria scans dozens of applications and selects the best to serve in the program. Each fall, Santa Maria places 15-20 members, like interns, with its own programs and external partner agencies, where they use their skills,

with services and resources. They make a difference every day in the lives of thousands of youth and families. It is impressive to note that there are over 140 AmeriCorps members serving in Cincinnati, representing 8 different AmeriCorps programs. Wellness Program Hosts Impactful Women's Group

Last Spring, Santa Maria's Wellness program hosted a Spanish speaking women's group in collaboration with several other agencies. With generous support from The Hispanic Chamber Cincinnati and Hispanos Avanzando Hispanos, the group began meeting and was called "Fortaleciéndote Mujer" (Empowering Women.) Maritza Dyer, from Addiction Serivces Council, led the group for ten weekly sessions. Topics of discussion ranged from acculturaton to domestic violence. With her knowledge, Maritza brought forth profound conversations in a safe, women-centered place.

Meanwhile, Lorena Mora-Maury, faithful companion of all things empowering, posted montages of the weekly lessons learned on social media. The group's overwhelming success led The Hispanic Chamber to extend the program to English speakers. The English-speaking group hosts both American-born and immigrant English-speaking women. Participants in other Santa Maria programs, such as Promoting Our Preschoolers and Stable Families attended. Both groups drew in women from the community who heard about the program from past participants.
