Santa Maria's International Welcome Center Hosts Business Course

Santa Maria's International Welcome Center hosted an accelerated 8 week business course through Microenterprises for members of the Price Hill community. This course ensures that families are provided intensive education on business basics that will prove essential for start-up success. Members are taught the basics of buisness models, finance and accounting.

The acceelerated business course was a continuation of the Female Entrepreneurship Program held in the summer of 2014. The Female Entrepreneurship program provided aspiring female entrepreneurs with basic business and manufacturing skills, specifically jewelry making. The passion and continued





interest of these women led to the accelerated business course which allows them to have a deeper pursuit of their business studies. By the end of the accelerated business course, there were thirteen graduates.

Santa Maria's International Welcome Center will follow through with the successes of these past two programs by continuing with a Female Entrepreneurship Program for the summer of 2015. During the summer, participants of the past programs will have a chance to utilize their business education and jewelry making training to do business projects. These business projects allow them the experience being business women with little risk, thereby encouraging them to grow and seek out their full potential as entrepreneurs.

Price Hill Pacer Celebrating 10th Anniversary

2015 marks the 10th Anniversary for the popular Price Hill Pacer Run/Walk event, an idea inspired by former Santa Maria board member, Mark Davis. The 10th Annual Price Hill pacer starts at 8:30 am on Saturday, June 13, at Elder High School's Schaeper Center (Vincent Avenue entrance). Distances include the 5K (3.1 miles), 10K (6.2 Miles) and the One Mile Hart Pharmacy Run/Walk. The Price Hill Pacer committee, along with Title Sponsors, Macy's and SC Ministry Foundation, challenge everyone to "Conquer the Hill!"

This year, the race committee is proud to announce the addition of a 10K course. "The 10K course is a challenging course," says committee chair, Leslie Schultz. "This course will travel down Seton, go west on West 8th, make a loop inside the New St. Joseph Cemetery, and then make its way back to Vincent by way of Schiff, Ridgeview,



Hermosa, St. Lawrence, Kreis and West 8th. We encourage residents along the route to come out and cheer the participants to the finish line!"

In addition to the race, family fun entertainment includes a juggler, balloon artist and face painter. The Free Kids' Fun Run in Elder's Pit will take place at 10 am.



At the beginning of 2015, Santa Maria Community Services received a \$15,000 "Join the Fun" grant from Interact for Health to add the 10K to the race. The Interact for Health grant also boosts healthy activity in the neighborhood by supporting the Price Hill Pacer's free training program.

"We know when people are active, they are healthier," says Jaime Love, program officer for healthy eating and active living at Interact For Health. "And being active with your community can reduce stress, enhance self-esteem and foster an overall sense of well-being. We saw an amazing turnout with the addition of the training program for last year's event, and we want to build on that success by adding the 10K to this year's race."

Since the end of February over 70 individuals have taken advantage of the free training sessions, which take place on alternating Tuesday and Wednesday evenings and Saturday mornings. "The Price Hill Pacer Training Group has walked and ran all over Price Hill, with some of the participants covering over 140 miles," Ms. Schultz says enthusiastically. "I know the training group participants will be ready for the Price Hill Pacer!" The Free Price Hill Pacer Training Group is open to racers of all skill levels (beginning to advanced.)

Santa Maria Celebrates GED Graduates

On May 21 at Elder High School's Schaeper Center, Santa Maria's Workforce Development program awarded 15 GED program participants with much-deserved diplomas. Keynote speaker Dr. Eric Abercrumbie from the University of Cincinnati gave a powerful and encourageing address to those in attendance.

Santa Maria's Workforce Development GED class of 2015 consisted of 15 graduates who come from all different backgrounds and experiences, but each share the fact that they have persevered through long hours of studying for the 2014 version of the GED. In 2014 the State of Ohio adopted the new version of the GED that had significant changes from the 2002 GED version.

The most recent test version is completely computer based and is more adapted to the common core curriculum. This can pose a challenge for adult students who have been out of school for quite some time and have little familiarity with computers. However, there are many things to be celebrated about the newest GED version. Students are able to take one section of the test at a time and this enables them to devote focused time to one content area (there are 4 sections total.) Furthermore, the computer based test

allows students to identify key areas that they need to improve upon in order to pass the test.

After the graduation ceremony, friends, family, Santa Maria employees and guests gathered for a celebration meal to honor the graduates. The Workforce Development Program is extremely proud of the 2015 graduates.

Advocates For Immigrant Health Honored

Santa Maria's Bienestar/Wellness program awarded the Sister Margarita Brewer Hope Award to Alfonso Cornejo, president of the Hispanic Chamber Cincinnati USA, for his tireless advocacy for the health, well-being and progress of Hispanics in the Tri-State area. At the Bienestar Recognition Luncheon an organizational award was presented to the Hispanic Chamber Cincinnati USA for its leadership role and emphasis on health initiatives. "Bienestar" means "wellness" in Spanish.

The Sister Margarita Brewer Hope Award, named for the first honoree at the Bienestar Recognition Luncheon in 2006, is awarded each year to an individual who works diligently for health access and health care for Hispanic/Latino immigrants. Both Cornejo and the Hispanic Chamber are devoted to enhancing health and education options for the area's Hispanic/Latino populations.

Block By Block - Our Healthy Homes

The Block by Block Initiative utilizes residents from the community in a role that has been termed "Block Captains." Block Captains are neighbors on the block who seek to identify and support the most at-risk families in the East and Lower Price Hill neighborhoods of Cincinnati. The Initiative will develop these informational community leaders, or Block Captains, work with them to find and engage hard to reach families and support local shifts in the local cultural norms in partnership with the trusted neighborhood residents.

By tapping into the wisdom and experience of local residents, Block by Block seeks to change the outcomes for children and their families. On regular neighborhood walks, block captains look for inherent strengths and identify needs on the blocks they serve. Based on the information collected on walks and at gatherings, the team develops a communication network customized to serve neighborhood families.

One goal is to build a cadre of informal but influential local health leaders who can shift the 'culture of health' in their own neighborhood. The Block by Block team is actively building a sense of fellowship and camaraderie among the Block Captians, because this is critical for long-term success. This goal will empower local residents to deliver materials, resources and community engagement opportunities to their neighbors and to increase the well-being of children and families.

The Block by Block team envisions that Block Captains will ultimately help families address barriers (financial, social, health, educational) that stand in the way of personal and family related goals. Currently 12 block captains have identified 51 active target homes on 5 blocks. Their work was initially focused on developing 'HealthyHomes' on the blocks. This means that the homes will have a working smoke detector, 15 children's books with information about shared reading, safe sleep options for newborns (along with a teach back on the ABCs of safe sleep) and a medical OB/GYN and pediatric home. To date, 35 of the active target homes have a complete bundle.

Success will be thriving neighborhoods connected by a shared vision for healthy children, influenced by informal neighborhood leaders, who serve a critical role in reaching the hardest to reach families. In the end, an initial evaluation of this protoype will demonstrate enough strength for scaling up the effort delivering a toolkit that other neighborhoods could adapt and utilize based on their unique assets and needs. In addition, success will include guiding other neighborhoods with similar issues to successful strategies.
