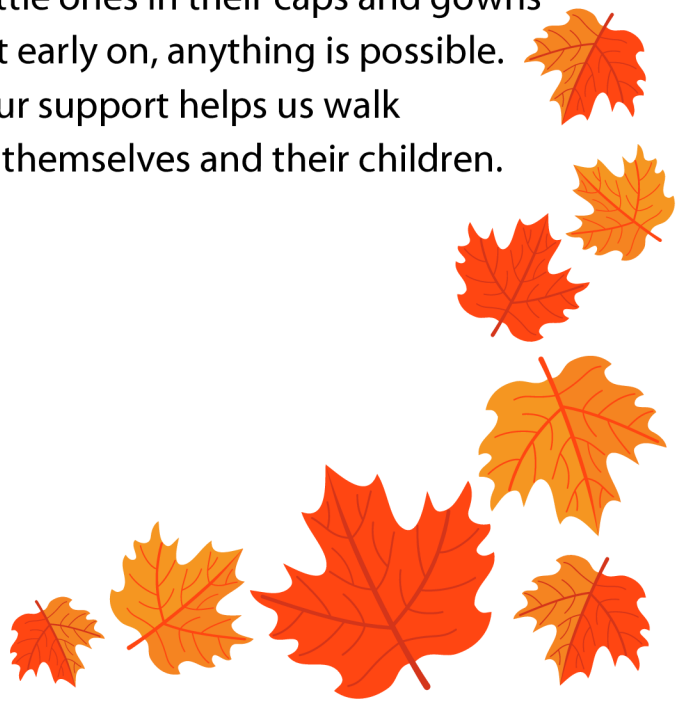

A LADDER OUT OF THE HOLE: YOFREY'S STORY

In 2021, Yofrey felt like life was closing in. He and his family were overwhelmed. "It felt like I was in a hole," he said. "And Santa Maria gave me a ladder to step out of it."

After trying churches and other organizations, someone pointed him to Santa Maria Community Services. From the moment he connected with Francesca, Santa Maria's Stable Families Coordinator, things started to change. "It was the easiest and most one-on-one experience," Yofrey shared. "I didn't feel like just a number. Francesca really cared."

She helped find resources to cover bills, connected them to doctors, therapists, a dentist for his wife, and even someone to fix their car. When school came around, she made sure the kids had what they needed. "Santa Maria is a beautiful source, whether financially or emotionally. Whatever we needed, Francesca was there."

It wasn't easy for Yofrey to ask for help. "I always want to consider myself a strong person, but I felt vulnerable," he said. "Francesca made me feel like it was okay. Santa Maria gave me a rock to lean on."

With encouragement and coaching, Yofrey and his wife began budgeting, saving, and working toward buying their first home. Francesca shared classes on saving money and tenant rights and encouraged him to look for higher-paying jobs. "If something happens and we can't solve it on our own, we know Francesca will help us figure it out."

Someday, Yofrey hopes to return the support. "When you ask a friend, 'Can I borrow some money and pay you back next week?' That's Santa Maria, a friend. And when I become rich enough to donate, I'm going right to Santa Maria. We're so grateful for the funds. Anytime you need a translator or volunteer, I'd like to pay you back."

His one wish? "I wish Santa Maria had billions and billions," he said. "Because you guys know how to do it."

To our ECS and POP families, thank you for allowing us to be part of your journey. Your commitment inspires us, and we look forward to what comes next.

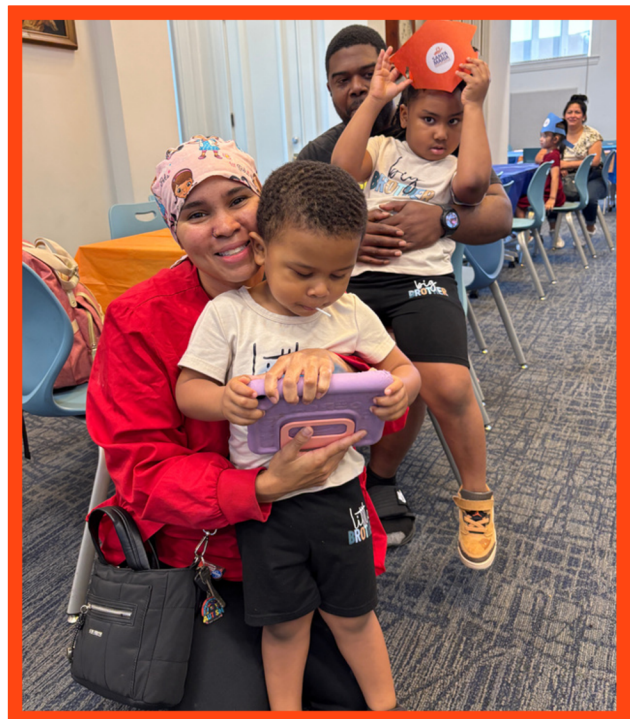

A LIFELONG CONNECTION: JOE AND JOANN'S STORY

For Joe and Joann, Santa Maria Community Services has been more than just a cause they support. It has been a meaningful part of their individual journeys and, eventually, their life together.

Joe first became involved in the mid-1990s, seeking a way to give back through the United Way. Drawn to Santa Maria's mission of building family stability and self-sufficiency, he joined the finance committee and eventually served on the board. What impressed him most was how Santa Maria continually adapted its programs to meet the evolving needs of the Price Hill community. "Santa Maria doesn't just provide a service and hope people do well," Joe explained. "They help people grow into self-sufficiency."

What Joe didn't know at the time was that his wife, Joann, had a personal history with Santa Maria that stretched back decades. As a young girl from a difficult home environment, Joann found a sense of safety and belonging at Santa Maria. She remembered a social worker named Mrs. Maloney and her daughter, Lenore, who took a special interest in her. Through music, plays, and encouragement, they helped Joann discover her voice both emotionally and artistically. "Santa Maria was a lifesaver," she said. "It was like a home. I'd go there most days after school. It was amazing."

That early encouragement helped spark a lifelong love of music and gave Joann the confidence to pursue opportunities she never imagined. "They gave us courage," she recalled. "They were telling us we could do this. And so we did."

The couple didn't realize their shared Santa Maria connection until well after Joe's time on the board. For him, learning about Joann's childhood experience added a deeper layer of meaning to his volunteer work. "I always wondered how she came out of the environment she did, the way she did," he shared. "Santa Maria was definitely one of the reasons."

Today, Joe and Joann remain active supporters. Joe has designated Santa Maria as a contingent beneficiary of his IRA and continues to stay up to date on the organization's work, including the exciting progress of the new building. He sees the consolidation of services into one permanent space as a major step forward, one that will strengthen access and impact for the families who rely on Santa Maria's programs.

As parents, grandparents, and long-time supporters of Santa Maria, Joe and Joanne have always made family a priority, not just for their own family, but for the families throughout our community. Their continued support reflects a deep commitment to helping others find stability and opportunity, and their journey with Santa Maria is a powerful reminder that seeds planted long ago, whether through music or mentoring, volunteering or giving, can continue to grow for generations.

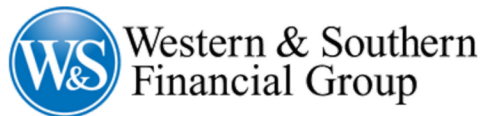

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HONORING OUR ROOTS: A SPECIAL VISIT WITH THE SEGALE FAMILY

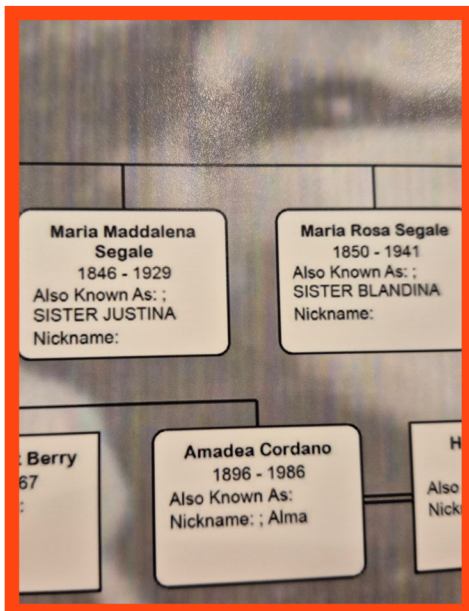


This summer, Santa Maria was honored to attend the Segale Family Reunion, a gathering of descendants of Sisters Justina and Blandina Segale, who founded Santa Maria in 1897.

More than 100 family members traveled from six states to celebrate the sisters' legacy. One family member and Santa Maria supporter, Molly Taggart, shared, "It was a real blessing and special honor to have [Santa Maria] in attendance with us to bring joy to the celebratory day."

The reunion gave us the chance to share updates on our work in Price Hill and reflect on how the Segale sisters' mission still guides us today. In a moving show of generosity, the family donated funds to Santa Maria to support families working toward stability and self-sufficiency.

At our recent Passport to Success: UNITY fundraiser, we proudly shared exciting news: Santa Maria is nearing the finish line of our \$15.5 million capital campaign to build a permanent home for our programs and families at 1048 Considine Avenue in East Price Hill.

After decades of operating from scattered and repurposed spaces, our future 26,600-square-foot headquarters will bring all of our services under one roof in a building intentionally designed to meet the needs of the community. This new space will provide a welcoming and efficient hub for families working toward self-sufficiency and stability.
